Dear Families,

As our first trimester closes, we are excited to share the progress your child has made. Report cards give you a snapshot of where your child is currently meeting grade level expectations, along with areas of future growth. This first trimester in particular allows us to set goals and work directly with you to find opportunities for new challenges and continued support.

To ensure that our students meet the high standards in writing, the Issaquah School District adopted a rigorous writing curriculum several years ago. Since the writing expectations look at end of year standards, we have slightly modified the scores so that students are graded where they currently are preforming. As the year progresses and students continue to receive writing instruction in Units of Study, we have high expectations that all students will continue to make considerable growth in the area of writing. Please be aware that our personal narrative unit is the most difficult, and during conferences we will highlight specific writing skills that your child can continue to develop.

In addition, for the past few years we have been using the Eureka Math curriculum. Deep mastery of mathematical concepts is one of the major goals, as is building students' confidence as mathematicians. Report card grades are based on evidence of learning such as module assessments, exit slips, assignments, problemsolving tasks and direct observations of students demonstrating their proficiency in class. Many of the math concepts are assessed at a deeper level than in the past, in alignment with higher standards. We are excited to see their engagement and their growth, and are proud of how students have been able to thrive with the increased rigor.

We are excited to meet with you and your child during conferences, and hope you find lots of things to celebrate on the report card.
